D. DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- » Cities need money to build rapid transit. They argue that provincial tax money should be used to support these expensive projects. What are some good reasons for everyone, urban and rural, to support this undertaking?
- Tourism is an important industry in many parts of Canada, the Rocky Mountains being no exception. It is a mixed blessing: it brings dollars into the community to have people staying in hotels, eating at restaurants, and buying gas and souvenirs, for example. But it also brings garbage and air pollution and disturbs the calm of an otherwise beautiful natural setting in the Rockies. The government decided to allow a commercial enterprise into Jasper National Park which will build a huge observation deck and charge a large admission fee. The tourists will love it. The locals do not, and fear the consequences. What do you think?
- The small family farms of past years are slowly becoming few in number. They are being replaced by large agri-businesses and the third- and fourth-generation children of farming families are seeking their fortunes in the cities. Agri-businesses use pesticides and herbicides, which are highly effective and fast-acting, in the cultivation process. However, they are also harmful to the land and many think they are also harmful to those of us who eat what is grown on land sprayed with those chemicals. More and more people want organic produce and are willing to pay more to get it. How can we encourage farmers to keep their family farms and grow the kind of healthy food we know is good for us?
- Saskatchewan is the home of Tommy Douglas, the father of medicare in Canada. It is also the birthplace of a large cooperative movement that continues to shape the heart and soul of the people of Saskatchewan even today. This movement was born in the Great Depression, when money was very scarce and people had to help one another to survive. Can you think of examples in the world today where people are transforming bad situations into good ones through cooperation on small and large scales?
