D. DISCUSSION TOPICS

- I distinctly remember the first time I had the privilege of taking in a couple of plays in Stratford. It was a beautiful summer and my aunt and uncle from Toronto had arranged to take me there to see one Shakespearean play and one other play. We stayed in a lovely bed and breakfast—also a first for me—and had an absolutely memorable time together. I was hooked and have gone back several times to enjoy the magic of good theatre performed brilliantly by talented teams of people. Some people have no interest in arts and culture, while others do. What arguments can you think of as to why live theatre is valuable for us all?
- In southern Ontario, there are several places where you can see horse-drawn black carriages on country roads driven by men in black suits with beards. Sometimes, you'll see the horses hitched to a hitching post in town while the driver unloads fresh produce, to be sold at a local market. Some of these people are Old Order Mennonites and others Amish. Fenelon Falls is one Ontario town that values the presence of these communities; non-Mennonite and non-Amish residents try to be considerate when sharing roads with them in their cars and trucks and make way for them when the town becomes busier in summer. They are part of the community. What value do you see in supporting those who come from other cultures with customs that are very different from the majority?
- Ottawa, Canada's capital city, is located in Ontario. One of its striking features is the fact that 40 percent of the population identify themselves as bilingual in English and French. Indeed, when you visit the city, you hear both languages being used in the streets and restaurants wherever you go.
